1780 Portrait of George Washington and William (Billy) Lee - "In this [portrait of George Washington](#), he is shown standing on a bluff above the Hudson River with his enslaved personal servant, [William "Billy" Lee](#), on horseback behind him. The view across the river encompasses West Point, New York, with a red-and-white banner, possibly the Navy ensign adopted in 1775, flying atop the fortress. Trumbull had served on Washington's staff as an aide-de-camp early in the Revolutionary War. He painted this portrait from memory about five years later, when he was studying in London. **It was the first authoritative representation of Washington available in Europe and was soon copied throughout the Continent.**" Metropolitan Museum of Art, Bequest of Charles Allen Munn

George Washington sat for Trumbull in Philadelphia in 1792; from that sitting, the artist created a fullsize canvas (Yale University Art Gallery, New Haven, Conn.) and this smaller version. The general is shown on the evening before the pivotal Battle of Trenton in late 1776. He looks upward, conceiving his strategy against the vastly superior approaching enemy. The significance of the moment is expressed in the drama of the threatening sky and by the excitable horse, held in check by a soldier groom
